

The Need of Identity

- No moderation
- Freedom allows for users to be anyone but no control over the other chat room member
- Chatroulette map with shows the location of the other chat room member

Argument

• With fail-safes in place, it is better to air on the side of rights, or anonymity, not just because it has less of a slippery slope, but also because anonymity doesn't inherently cause problems, but instead causes an opportunity for it but also has other uses.
