

## Discussion

### Why is personality so hard to judge?

#### Hypothesis:

- -It is easy to judge social life based on pictures, posts, and number of friends
- -It is easy to judge work, interests, and hobbies based on "likes," "about me" section, etc.
- -Personality traits are harder to judge because they rely more on interpretation and personal opinion of the person.

## For example...



- We could draw many conclusions from this picture of Kilee, such as:
  - It looks like she is going to a party. She probably has an active social life. (Social Life judgement)
  - She goes to parties, she probably does not focus on school or work. (Work/Hobbies judgement)
  - She is a partier. (Personality judgement)
- Based on this one photo, one could come to the conclusion that Kilee is a partier which has many implications to our conception of her personality as a whole (mostly negative ones)
- There is no way we can accurately judge one's personality based on just a few photos!
- Kilee is studious and takes work seriously, but since she doesn't post photos of herself studying for a test, we don't perceive her as a studious, responsible person.

## Conclusion

- Most people feel that they accurately portray their lives and selfhood on Facebook, but are you making the statement you think you are making?
- No, probably not!
- Here are some trends we noticed in the discrepancies between intended portrayal and perception:
  - Social life and work/hobbies were the most widely agreed upon areas of personhood
  - Personality was the most widely disagreed upon area.

- We control the amount and type of information we put on Facebook and assume this means that we are controlling our portrayal of ourselves.
- But we cannot control the way in which people perceive this information or the conclusions they come to about our identity.
- This is no different than our real lives in which we are judged every day by the people we encounter. We can dress, speak, and behave in a certain way to make ta good impression, but we cannot control how people will judge us!
