#### Action

#### We sent a proposal letter to the ASUO President.

The website would allow students and faculty to discuss and submit petitions for changes they'd like to see happen on campus, and vote on the ones they'd like to see happen, which would be considered by the U of O government. We feel this would be a good addition to the U of O website because it would unify the members of the U of O with the higher-up government members, helping make a more bottom-up government system rather than a top-down government where the higher-ups choose what to change on campus and have the students and faculty vote on their ideas.
